

# GROUPS AND SUBGROUPS

As most members know, YCWI's main online presence is our facebook group, where posts range from ministry stories to resources to invitations to share your Gaudete Sunday looks and everything in between. While there is certainly plenty of connection,

laughter, and commiseration to be shared there, young clergy women come to the group with a variety of experiences. Sometimes, you just need someone who *gets it*. That's where the YCWI subgroups come in.

In our 2020 annual report, we highlighted this statistic: "Our members participate in over sixty-four affinity groups (or subgroups) for support in specialized ministry, fellowship, and mutual care". Like all statistics, though, this number can't fully capture the wide and wonderful world of YCWI subgroups, which has only grown since that report. Subgroups are like moss (with thanks to Robin Wall Kimmerer): from the outside, they create the background green glow of the forest of YCWI, but when you truly look at them, you discover all the unexpected and vibrant ways fellowship can flourish.

Subgroups are smaller facebook groups, separate from our larger facebook group for all members. Some are what you'd expect from a group of clergy, like the Revised Common Lectionary subgroup, for those preaching from that collection of texts. Some are based on location, like YCWI Europe; others are formed around denomination affiliation; still others focus on the ins and outs of particular ministry positions, like chaplains, associate

pastors, or youth ministers. There are also subgroups for different walks in life, acknowledging the unique joys and challenges that come with striving for mental wellness, being a single clergy woman, or expecting a baby. Subgroups also have a tendency to spark focused conversations around shared experiences, allowing for even deeper connection.

Ministry can be isolating. No one has ever needed to tell a young clergy woman that, even before the pandemic. Subgroups help us chip away at that isolation, if for no other reason than they show us that no matter what our situation, we're not alone. There is someone else out there who gets it. And who knows where that connection will spread next? Twitter? Instagram? Discord? TikTok? Community, much like moss, much like divine Love, has a way of finding itself in unexpected spaces.



Gathering with YCWIs in your area for the first time? Getting ready for Pride? Tired of wrestling your pet into the same old bandana for the Blessing of the Animals?



### **ANTI-RACISM UPDATE**

Our commitment to adopt anti-racist practices at every level of YCWI moved into a new phase this year with the hiring of racial justice consultant, Jessica Davis. Board members shared this news with the membership in our October newsletter and through a piece in Fidelia, emphasizing the importance of addressing whiteness within YCWI and the commitment the Board has made to continue to pursue its anti-racist work, along with introducing Jess.

Jess joined the Board in November for in its first in-person retreat since 2019 to lay the groundwork for their time with us. The conversation was rich and challenging; though thorough work on the by-laws and other organizing documents still lies ahead, they were able to identify structural barriers and offer insights that have continued to resonate in the months since. The work ahead will be the combination of individual reflection and growth and organizational investigation that many are familiar with by now, though familiarity doesn't take away the difficulty of the task.

Still, the Board remains committed to the work and is both thankful for and encouraged by the wisdom and experience that Jess brings to this process. Follow our monthly newsletter for continuing updates on our anti-racism work, and be in prayer that the Spirit continues to move us toward something more like God's kin-dom here on earth.




### **CONFERENCE 2022/2024**

Our 2022 Conference, "In Every Place: Cultivating Subversive Community," was YCWI's first stab at a hybrid conference format, with two Zoom virtual sessions streamed to each of the in-person sites. The conference featured Preacher Rev. Dr. Irie Lynne and Keynote Speaker Brandi Miller, along with liturgy from Barn Geese Worship.

Attendees had the opportunity to connect with

each other at their satellite locations. As with so many other situations in 2022, the hybrid conference format was an attempt to find a balance between our



desire to gather together while maintaining some necessary distancing, and it was a joy to see how our conference planning team and satellite site hosts stepped up and delivered.

We are pleased to announce that YCWI's next conference will be an in-person gathering, taking place in May 2024. Discussions are already underway to confirm the exact dates and location for



the conference, and with more than a year of lead time, the Board will be able to focus on both their anti-racism work and preparing our first in-person conference since 2019. lieu of offering another virtual or hybrid conference, we invite YCWI members and alumni to restart (or start!) local and regional gatherings.

### FIDELIA 2022

Fidelia, YCWI's online magazine, featured an astounding 68 articles from young clergy women in 2022, more than the previous two years combined. As more churches returned to in-person worship, Fidelia shared prayers, litanies, communion settings, and sermon series in its Living Liturgy column, including "Famous Last Words," a four-part worship series exploring the last words of various books of the Bible, and "No Christmas Without Her," an Advent sermon series focused on the women in Jesus' genealogy.

As the Supreme Court in the United States ruled on abortion rights, writers filled the Such a Time as This and Here I Stand columns with passionate and compassionate discussions about healthcare, just as they lifted up the importance of reading banned books, calling for debt forgiveness, and knowing the land you stand on when current events called for it.

As ministry continues to shift and change in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, Fidelia revived the Ask a Young Clergy Woman column to answer questions about changing calls and featured reflections across the magazine on the challenges and opportunities of leaving traditional ministry for something new.



### FIDELIA 2022

What shines through in Fidelia's work this year, though, are the reflections on life: life in ministry, life in extraordinary times, life amid grief, and life as a mother. Second in pieces published only to Living Liturgy is the Ministry Lab column, where writers imagined ministry innovations and new ministry paths, sometimes with a little wisdom from heroines. "The Heroine's Journey" series takes readers through the story arc of the "hero's journey" through the eyes of a young clergy woman. Reviews and the considerations of fandom bring books and pop culture into the conversation. The rhythm of the Christian year beats throughout Fidelia's publications from Lent to Advent, and layered on this foundation are the quotidian aspects of life brought into holy examination: joy, grief, boundaries, periods, and conversations with loved ones.

With posts from more than thirty authors, Fidelia captured a snapshot of 2022 from several different angles and perspectives. The editors would like to thank each contributor, content writer, and writer-in-residence for their work this year. And remember, you are part of the Fidelia team as well: you can help us amplify the voices of young clergy women from around the world, including your own. 

## FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

YCWI continued to seek out new revenue streams for the organization in 2022, even as we continued to benefit from the on-going generous support of our members in meeting our financial obligations. In addition to continuing residuals from books in YCWI's line with Chalice Press, we received income from our SpreadShirt merchandise shop, AmazonSmile, and our new Bookshop.org shop. With the addition of an administrative assistant, we were able to reduce certain administrative expenditures and open up time for the Board to benefit from their time with our anti-racism consultant, Jessica Davis, who we contracted in mid-2022. We are in a strong position as we enter 2023 to not only continue in our justice work but also grow throughout this year and into 2024.



2022 saw the launch of YCWI's Bookshop.org shop. All of the books printed through our book line with Chalice Press are available on Bookshop, and we've collected them for easy access.
